What understanding and skills will I develop?

A GCSE in History provides the opportunity to study History in a variety of ways: in depth, across a broad span of time, through a local context and with reference to a diversity of cultures. Students study important and interesting aspects in the history of Britain, Europe and American History. Students will develop essential skills through opportunities to study history from a variety of perspectives, including political, social, economic and cultural, thereby helping candidates to appreciate the diversity of the societies studied, and the experiences of the people in these societies. Students will develop essential skills of analysis, argument, independent research, team work, interpreting evidence and formulating judgements to name a few.

How will I learn/ how will I be taught?

Students will learn through a variety of teaching methods that stimulate learning and enable progression. Students will analyse and evaluate historical evidence, studying a range of source material including text, pictures, diagrams and statistical information. Students will become independent learners and actively engage in the process of historical enquiry to reflect critically on what and how they learn. Learning activities are numerous and range from independent research to group work, practicing examination questions, peer assessment, and presenting work.

How will I be assessed?

Unit 1: Written Paper exam – 50%

Unit 2: Written Paper exam – 50%

What can this course lead on to?

A GCSE in History can lead to an A Level in History or employment. The skills developed can be applied in other subjects making History an invaluable choice.
